Affordable Housing –

Upcoming Deadlines

[Housing Planning Grant Program](#). Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA), Division of Local Government. State. Planning-based funding. Eligible entities municipalities, counties, city-and-county governments, councils of governments (COGs), regional planning commissions, and other public entities formed by local governments. *Supports development of housing needs assessments (HNAs), housing action plans, and updates to comprehensive plans or land use codes that advance affordable housing goals and increase housing supply. Funding may be used for data analysis, public engagement, consultant support, and policy development to align local*

planning with state housing priorities. Partnerships and multi-jurisdictional applications are encouraged. **Deadline March 30.**

[Proposition 123 Reports and Performance Measures Resource](#). Colorado Department of Local Affairs, Division of Housing. *State-level performance and policy resource providing reports, dashboards, and metrics tracking the implementation of Proposition 123, Colorado's affordable housing funding initiative. Includes data on annual allocations, program performance, and compliance with priorities such as affordability, density, and sustainability. Updated regularly to support planning, accountability, and transparency.*

Arts & Culture –

Upcoming Deadlines

[State Historical Fund \(SHF\)](#). History Colorado. State. Project-based funding. Eligible entities nonprofit organizations, local governments, public agencies, and private owners working to preserve historic resources in Colorado. *Supports preservation, restoration, rehabilitation, archaeological research, planning studies, and interpretation projects for historic buildings, structures, districts, and archaeological sites that provide clear public benefit. Funded through a portion of Colorado gaming tax revenue and administered by History Colorado, the program offers several grant types including Mini Grants (\$1–\$50,000), General Grants (\$50,001–\$250,000), and specialized noncompetitive grants for activities such as historic structure assessments and archaeological assessments. **Deadline April 1 12pm MST.***

[Lodgers' Tax Arts and Culture Funding](#). City of Durango, CO. Local project-based funding. Eligible entities individuals, artists, nonprofits, businesses, groups, and other organizations creating public arts, cultural events, creative placemaking projects, performances, festivals, exhibits, murals, artisan food projects, arts education, facility upgrades, and related creative work that enhances Durango's cultural vitality and visitor experience. *The program funds projects over \$5,000. Projects must be completed and reimbursements requested by the end of the funding year. Organizations are eligible to apply annually and can receive Lodgers' Tax Arts and Culture funding once per year; projects are evaluated on community benefit, local economic impact, innovation, sustainability, and off-season year-round value. **Deadline Round 2 May 31.***

[Film Festival Support and Promotion Grant](#). Colorado Office of Economic Development & Economic Trade. State. Eligible entities to apply for this sponsorship, your film festival needs to take place in Colorado. *The Film Festival Support and Promotion Grant supports more than 40 film festivals and educational events each year throughout Colorado. With a focus on Colorado's rural areas, film festivals bring economic activity to different areas of the state by attracting new visitors.*

Business/Economic Development –

Rolling Deadlines

[Public Works and Economic Adjustment Assistance](#). Economic Development Administration. Federal. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: State, local government, nonprofits 501c3 and not, special district governments, Tribes. *The Public Works program provides resources to meet the construction and/or infrastructure design needs of communities to enable them to become more economically competitive. Supported activities under EDA's EAA program include construction and non-construction such as construction or upgrading of public infrastructure, sectoral partnerships for workforce training, design and engineering, technical assistance, economic recovery strategies, and capitalization or re-capitalization of Revolving Loan Funds.*

[Advanced Industries Export Grant](#). Colorado Office of Economic Development & International Trade. State. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: small- and medium-sized Colorado advanced industry businesses. *Provides up to \$15,000 (50% of eligible costs) for export activities such as trade shows, marketing, translation, export training, and compliance support.*

[Business and Industry Loan Guarantees](#). US Department of Agriculture. Federal. Loan funding. Eligible entities: for-profit and nonprofit businesses, cooperatives, Tribes, public bodies, and individuals engaged or proposed to engage in a business. *Loan guarantees to improve, develop, or finance business, industry, and employment and improve the economic and environmental climate in rural communities.*

[Rural Business Investment Program](#). US Department of Agriculture. Federal. Startup funding. Eligible entities: for-profits and subsidiaries of an entity. *Provides a Rural Business Investment Company (RBIC) license to newly formed developmental capital organizations to fill the need for business and development capital in rural areas. The program works with for-profit developmental capital funds.*

[Rural Entrepreneur Grant](#). Startup Colorado. Private. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: rural entrepreneurs in Colorado. *Provides funding for business-related events, education, and technical resources to accelerate growth, covering expenses like registration fees and travel. Up to \$5,000.*

[Strategic Fund Job Growth Incentive](#). Colorado Office of Economic Development & International Trade. Business incentives. Eligible entities: Businesses considering interstate competitive expansion or relocation projects in Colorado. Project-based funding. *Funds for locating or expanding in the state, signing a lease, hiring employees related to this project, making material expenditures for this project.*

Childcare –

[Federal Child Care Funding & Program Integrity Resource \(CCDF / CCCAP\)](#). Colorado Department of Early Childhood (CDEC). State/federal program information and policy update. *This resource provides an overview of how the federal Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) supports child*

care access and quality in Colorado. The fact sheet outlines the current federal funding situation, including temporary restrictions on CCDF reimbursement announced in January 2026, potential fiscal impacts to child care assistance, licensing, quality improvement initiatives, and early childhood workforce supports, and the safeguards Colorado has in place to prevent fraud, waste, and abuse. It also describes the layered accountability systems used by CDEC, ongoing monitoring and oversight practices, and steps the Department is taking to maintain program integrity and continuity of services. This resource is intended to support partners, local governments, and service providers in understanding the role of CCDF funding in Colorado and the potential implications of federal funding disruptions.

Community Development –

Upcoming Deadlines

[Capital Grants Program](#). Gates Family Foundation. Private philanthropic funding. Eligible entities nonprofit organizations. *Supports capital investments that strengthen nonprofit infrastructure and community assets, including facility construction, renovation, accessibility improvements, technology and equipment upgrades, and other major investments that enhance organizational capacity and service delivery. Grants are typically one-time awards aligned with community priorities such as health and human services, education, arts and culture, and economic resilience. **Deadline September 1.***

[AmeriCorps Seniors RSVP Grant Program](#). AmeriCorps. Federal. Project and program funding. Eligible entities nonprofit organizations (including faith based), local, state, and Tribal governments, and institutions of higher education. *Supports community volunteer programs that engage adults age 55 and older in service activities addressing local needs such as food security, education and tutoring, disaster services, environmental stewardship, support for veterans and military families, tax and benefits assistance, and other community capacity building efforts. Projects are locally designed and connect older adults with flexible volunteer roles that strengthen community services. Funding provides up to \$75,000 plus approximately \$350 per unduplicated volunteer participant, with a minimum 10 percent match requirement that may include cash or in kind contributions. **Deadline March 26 5pm EST.***

[Rural Economic Development Loan and Grant Program \(REDLG\)](#). U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Rural Development. Federal loan and grant funding. Eligible entities current or former Rural Utilities Service (RUS) electric or telecommunications borrowers and eligible nonprofit utilities that serve rural communities; these entities act as intermediaries to pass funding to local businesses, nonprofits, and public bodies. *Supports projects that promote rural economic development and job creation, including business start-ups or expansions, community development initiatives, training facilities, medical facilities, and technical assistance activities. USDA **provides** zero-interest loans to eligible utilities, which then relend funds to local recipients,*

as well as grants that may be used to establish revolving loan funds for community projects. Individual awards may include loans up to approximately \$1,000,000 and grants up to \$300,000, depending on project scope and funding availability. **Deadline March 31.**

[Ballantine Family Fund](#). Ballantine Family Fund (private foundation). Local / regional philanthropic funding. Eligible entities nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations or projects under a nonprofit fiscal sponsor serving Southwest Colorado. *Support charitable causes that enhance quality of life in the region, the fund awards grants for general operations and specific programs across a broad range of community needs, including arts and culture, education, human services, environment/animal welfare, youth, and community development. Typical grant sizes range from \$500 to \$5,000.* **Deadlines quarterly March 31, June 30, September 30, and December 31.**

[Community Schoolyards Grant Program](#). Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA), Division of Local Government. State. Project-based funding. Eligible entities local governments, school districts, and community partners in Colorado. *Supports improvements to schoolyard spaces that enhance outdoor learning, recreation, and community use, including site amenities, shade, seating, play areas, stormwater management elements, green infrastructure, planting, path systems, and other enhancements that increase equitable access to safe and engaging outdoor environments. Projects are intended to benefit both students and surrounding neighborhoods by leveraging school grounds as shared community space.* **Deadline April 1.**

[Hometown Grants](#). T-Mobile. Foundation. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: local government, tribal leaders, or nonprofit community leaders. *The program will fund projects to build, rebuild, or refresh community spaces that help foster local connections in small towns (with populations less than 50,000), including town squares, historic buildings, outdoor parks, ball fields, or libraries. Elected leaders, town managers or employees, or nonprofit leaders are eligible to submit project details.* **Deadline: Awards will be made quarterly. Applications will be open on a quarterly basis and the portal will close on the last day of each quarter and reopen for the new quarter on the first of the month.**

[Spark Good Local Grants](#). Walmart Spark Good. Foundation funding. General. Eligible entities: Deed-verified organizations with a Spark Good account, including nonprofit organization (c3) government entities, schools, and faith-based groups with community-wide benefit. *Provides local cash grants ranging from \$250 to \$5,000 to support community-specific needs through an open application process.* **Deadline applications are accepted quarterly.**

Rolling Deadlines

[Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program](#). US Department of Agriculture. Federal. Project-based funding. Eligible entities rural local governments and Tribes. *This program provides affordable funding to develop essential community facilities in rural areas. An essential community facility is defined as a facility that provides an essential service to the local community for the orderly development of the community in a primarily rural area, and does not*

include private, commercial, or business undertakings. Detailed list of essential community facilities included in link.

[Craigslist Charitable Fund](#). Private. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: nonprofit organizations, fiscally sponsored projects, and individuals addressing animal exploitation and related issues with scalable, long-lasting impact. *Supports projects advancing animal protection, environmental sustainability, and social good initiatives. Grants generally cover no more than 30% of an organization's annual budget, though exceptions may be made. Academic institutions may allocate up to 10% for indirect costs. Applications are reviewed in quarterly cycles beginning in 2026, with decisions typically issued within two months of the close of each submission window. Funds are generally disbursed within one to two weeks of notification. Fiscal sponsorship is permitted for applicants without 501(c)(3) status.*

[Thriving Communities Technical Assistance](#). Department of Housing & Urban Development. Federal. Eligible entities are those that are eligible under specific grants. *Technical assistance funding. To receive HUD's Thriving Communities technical assistance (TA), jurisdictions must be a unit of general local government that is receiving federal transportation funding (directly or indirectly through the state) and use that funding to support a project that coordinates transportation and housing plans, programs or investments to benefit residents and businesses.*

Emergency & Disaster –

Rolling Deadlines

[Disaster Supplemental Grant](#). Economic Development Administration. Federal. Project-based. *Grants for areas in a Presidentially declared disaster region may be eligible for highly flexible grants to use building up a strong and modern workforce. EDA's role in disaster recovery is to facilitate the timely and effective delivery of federal economic development assistance to support long-term community economic recovery planning and project implementation, redevelopment and resiliency.*

Energy & Environment –

Upcoming Deadlines

[Forest Legacy Program](#). Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS) in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service. Federal/state funding. Eligible entities private forest landowners working with conservation partners, land trusts, or public agencies to protect environmentally significant forest lands in Colorado. *Supports permanent conservation of private forestlands that are at risk of conversion to non-forest uses through acquisition of conservation easements or fee-simple land purchases, while allowing landowners to retain ownership and continue sustainable forest*

*management in many cases. Projects prioritize lands with important ecological, scenic, recreation, watershed, or wildlife habitat values and that contribute to maintaining large, intact forest landscapes. Federal funding may cover up to 75% of project costs, with at least 25% non-federal match from state, local, or private sources. **Deadline May 1.***

[Human-Bear Conflict Reduction Community Grant Program](#). Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW). State. Project based funding. Eligible applicants include local governments, nonprofit organizations, homeowner associations, community groups, businesses, Tribal governments, universities, and individuals in Colorado. *The program supports projects that reduce conflicts between people and black bears in local communities. Eligible activities typically focus on reducing attractants or discouraging bears from entering high conflict areas, such as installation of bear resistant trash containers, community education programs, improved waste management infrastructure, or other innovative strategies that help communities safely coexist with wildlife. CPW is offering approximately \$1 million in total funding, with individual awards generally ranging from \$50,000 to \$500,000 through a competitive grant process. **Deadline May 29.***

Rolling Deadlines

[Brownfields Program](#). Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE) State, federal pass through. Project-based and financing support. Eligible entities local governments, nonprofit organizations, watershed or community groups, and other public or nonprofit stakeholders. *Supports activities such as environmental site assessments (Phase I/II), cleanup planning, property reuse planning, and revitalization efforts that transform blighted properties into productive community assets. Contact CDPHE for current application processes and eligibility details.*

[Energy Code Adoption Grant](#). Colorado Energy Office (CEO). State. Project-based funding for local governments. Eligible entities: municipalities, counties and other local government entities in Colorado looking to adopt or enforce updated building energy codes (e.g. 2021 IECC plus Colorado Model Electric-Ready & Solar-Ready codes). *Supports direct financial assistance covering costs of code adoption and enforcement, staff or consultant time, and related training/technical assistance. **Quarterly deadlines.***

Health & Behavioral Health –

[Assisted Outpatient Treatment \(AOT\) Program](#). Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Federal. Project-based funding through a cooperative agreement. Eligible entities include states, counties, cities, Tribal governments, mental health systems, mental health courts, and other entities authorized under state law to oversee Assisted Outpatient Treatment programs. *Supports implementation and expansion of Assisted Outpatient Treatment programs that provide community-based treatment and coordinated services for adults with serious mental illness who meet state-specific criteria for court ordered outpatient care. Projects typically involve multidisciplinary partnerships among courts, behavioral health providers, and community organizations to improve treatment access, reduce hospitalization or*

*incarceration, and support long term recovery. Approximately \$10 million in total funding is expected with around 16 awards. **Deadline April 20.***

[Children’s Mental Health Initiative \(CMHI\)](#). Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Federal. Project-based funding through a cooperative agreement. Eligible entities include state governments, governmental units within political subdivisions of a state (such as counties or cities), and federally recognized Tribal governments or Tribal organizations. *The program supports comprehensive community mental health services for children, youth, and young adults from birth through age 21 who have or are at risk of serious emotional disturbance, as well as their families. Funding supports development and expansion of coordinated systems of care, early identification and intervention, family support services, and community partnerships to improve access to behavioral health services. Approximately \$43.3 million in total funding is expected with around 22 awards, with individual awards up to about \$3 million. **Deadline April 20.***

[Implementing Zero Suicide in Health Systems](#). Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). Federal. Project-based funding through a cooperative agreement. Eligible entities include domestic public and private nonprofit organizations, healthcare systems, state or local governments, Tribal governments, and other eligible behavioral health providers. *Supports implementation of the Zero Suicide framework within healthcare systems to improve suicide prevention for adults at risk of suicide. Projects focus on building comprehensive suicide prevention approaches within healthcare settings such as primary care, behavioral health clinics, emergency departments, and public health systems, including screening, treatment pathways, care coordination, and workforce training. Approximately \$16.1 million in total funding is expected with around 31 awards. **Deadline April 20.***

[Department of Transportation Navigator](#). US Department of Transportation. *Helps communities navigate the best ways to apply for grants, and plan for and deliver transformative infrastructure projects and services. Provides an overview of grant programs under the Resources for [Grant Seekers tab](#).*

Water –

Upcoming Deadlines

[Water Supply Reserve Fund \(WSRF\) Grants](#). Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). State. Project-based funding. Eligible entities local governments, special districts, water and sanitation districts, conservancy and conservation districts, irrigation and water activity enterprises, mutual ditch companies, nonprofits, individuals, and partnerships involved in water projects in Colorado. *Provides funding to assist Colorado water users in addressing critical water supply issues and interests, including technical assistance for permitting, feasibility studies, and environmental compliance; studies or analyses of structural and nonstructural water needs; design of structural projects; and infrastructure replacement or maintenance activities. Requests*

*for funding must first be reviewed and recommended by the appropriate Basin Roundtable before being submitted to the CWCB Board for final consideration. **Deadlines to present to the SW Basin Roundtable March 31, June 21, and Sept 21.***

[Small Surface Water and Groundwater Storage Projects \(Small Storage Program\)](#). U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation. Federal. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: include state, county, city or township, and special district governments; joint powers authorities; federally recognized Tribal governments and tribal organizations; and IRS 501c3 nonprofits (excluding institutions of higher education) located in the 17 western U.S. states, Alaska, or Hawaii. *The program supports planning, design, and/or construction of small surface or groundwater storage projects with capacities between 200 and 30,000 acre-feet, offering up to 25 percent federal cost-share. Priority is given to multi-benefit, regional, and multi-stakeholder projects that enhance reliability, ecosystem resilience, groundwater management, or water quality. **Deadline April 17, by 4:00 pm EST.***

[Small-Scale Water Efficiency Projects](#). U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Federal. Project based funding through grants or cooperative agreements. Eligible applicants include states, federally recognized Tribes, irrigation and water districts, and regional or local authorities with water or power delivery authority in the Western United States, including Colorado. Nonprofit conservation organizations may apply if partnering with an eligible water management entity. *The program supports implementation of small scale projects that conserve water and improve water supply reliability in water delivery systems. Examples include canal lining, automated water delivery systems, installation of flow measurement devices, and other infrastructure improvements that increase water use efficiency. Approximately \$4 million in total funding is available with awards ranging from about \$1,000 to \$125,000. Cost share is required. **Deadline June 2 4pm MST.***

[Water Plan Grant Program](#). Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB). State. Project-based funding. Eligible entities local governments, water providers, irrigation and conservation districts, nonprofit organizations, and other entities involved in water planning and implementation. *Supports projects that advance the goals of the Colorado Water Plan, including water supply development, water conservation, watershed health, agricultural water protection, water sharing and efficiency projects, recreation and environmental enhancements, and water planning or engagement initiatives. The program is funded primarily through state sports betting tax revenue and administered by the Colorado Water Conservation Board. Based on current revenue projections, CWCB anticipates approximately \$37 million will be available for Water Plan Grants during the next state fiscal year through the July 1 and December 1, 2026 application cycles. Applicants requesting letters of support from the Southwest Basin Roundtable must either present their project at an in person Roundtable meeting or contact Roundtable Chair Peter Butler at least three weeks prior to the July 1 or December 1 deadlines. **Deadlines July 1 and December 1.***

[WaterSMART Applied Science Grants](#). U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Federal. Project based funding through grants and cooperative agreements. Eligible applicants include states, federally

recognized Tribes, irrigation and water districts, and regional or local authorities with water or power delivery authority in the Western United States, including Colorado. Universities, nonprofit research institutions, and nonprofit organizations may also apply if partnering with an eligible water management entity. *The program supports projects that improve hydrologic data access, water supply forecasting, modeling tools, and decision support systems used by water managers and reservoir operators. Projects may include improved snowpack monitoring, enhanced forecasting technologies, development of hydrologic databases, and improved operational models for water deliveries or reservoir management to strengthen drought resilience and water supply reliability. Approximately \$6 million in total funding is expected with about 20 awards up to \$400,000, and cost share is required. **Deadline July 8 5pm MST.***

[WaterSMART Drought Response Program](#). U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Federal. Project-based funding through grants and cooperative agreements. Eligible applicants include states, federally recognized Tribes, irrigation districts, water districts, and regional or local authorities with water or power delivery authority in the Western United States, including Colorado. Nonprofit conservation organizations may also apply if partnering with an eligible water or power authority. *The program supports projects that improve drought resilience through activities such as drought contingency planning, water management strategies, infrastructure improvements that increase water storage or distribution capacity, water source diversification, and development of decision-support tools for water management. Approximately \$13.5 million in total funding is expected with around 20 awards ranging from about \$25,000 to \$1.5 million. Cost share is required. **Deadline July 28 4pm MST.***

Rolling Deadlines

[Source Water Assessment and Protection \(SWAP\) Program](#). Colorado Department of Public Health & Environment (CDPHE), Water Quality Control Division. State. Grant and technical assistance funding. Eligible entities public water systems and community stakeholders working to develop or implement source water protection plans. *Supports assessment of drinking water sources to identify potential contaminant threats, and development and implementation of community-based source water protection plans to safeguard drinking water quality. The program also provides funding and support for related activities such as wildfire preparedness and recovery planning for water systems and digitizing infrastructure assets at risk. Typical support includes planning grants and technical assistance; separate funding and grant amounts are available to systems that complete protection planning.*

[Emergency Community Water Assistance Grants in Colorado](#). US Department of Agriculture. Federal. Emergency funding. Eligible entities: local government, nonprofits, Tribes. *Emergency-based funding. This program helps eligible communities prepare, or recover from, an emergency that threatens the availability of safe, reliable drinking water. Water transmission line grants up to \$150,000 to construct waterline extensions, repair breaks or leaks in existing water distribution lines, and address related maintenance necessary to replenish the water supply. Water source grants up to \$1,000,000 for the construction of new wells, reservoirs, transmission lines, treatment plants, and/or other sources of water (water source up to and including the treatment plant).*

[Water & Waste Disposal Loan & Grant Program](#). US Department of Agriculture. Federal. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: local government, nonprofits, Tribes. *This program provides funding for clean and reliable drinking water systems, sanitary sewage disposal, sanitary solid waste disposal, and storm water drainage to households and businesses in eligible rural areas. Funds may be used to finance the acquisition, construction, or improvement of drinking water sourcing, treatment, storage, and distribution; sewer collection, transmission, treatment, and disposal; solid waste collection, disposal, and closure; storm water collection, transmission, and disposal.*

[Community Funding Partnership](#). Colorado River District. Project-based funding. Eligible entities: include local governments, nonprofits, irrigation districts, and other stakeholders within the Colorado River District's 15-county Western Slope region. *Provides funding for multi-benefit water projects in five categories: productive agriculture, infrastructure, healthy rivers, watershed health and water quality, and conservation and efficiency. Grants aim to support projects that enhance water resilience and leverage additional funding from state, federal, and private sources. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis; however, for funding requests exceeding \$50,000, applications must be submitted at least six weeks prior to the quarterly board meetings held in January, April, July, and October.*
